Key Facts

- You have two sets of teeth in your lifetime.
- Adults have 32 teeth whilst children only have 20.
- Our stomach can stretch. An adult's stomach can hold approximately 1.5 litres of food and drink.
- Our oesophagus is approximately 25m long.
- It take 7 seconds for our food to travel to the stomach once you have swallowed it.
- Scientists believe we have wisdom teeth because our ancestors used to eat a lot of tougher food, such as leaves and nuts, which needed more grinding.
- **Incisors:** We have 8 and they are flat and are sometimes described as spade shapes.
- Canines: We have 4. They are pointy and sometimes referred to as fangs.
- Pre-molars: We have 8 and they are towards the back of our mouths. They hold and crush our food.
- Molars: There are 8 and they are the largest teeth which grind our food.
- Wisdom: We have four as we get older and they help to grind our food.

Digestive system: series of organs that break down food

Oesophagus: tubes running from mouth to stomach

Saliva: a fluid in the mouth which helps break down food

Peristalsis: the movement of food through parts of the digestive

system

Incisors: front teeth for cutting food

Molars: wide, flat teeth for grinding food **Enamel** very hard layer covering the tooth

Fluoride: ingredient in toothpaste that helps prevent cavities forming

Consumer: an animal which gets its food from other living things **Predator**: an animal that gets its food from killing and eating other

animals
