- Commitment is challenging and rewarding.
- Commitment involves hard work, compromise and determination not to give up too easily.
- The origins of marriage are rooted in a desire for security and family.
- Marriage started as an agreement between two families in ancient Jewish tradition that was legal but not religious.
- Religious Christian weddings started in the Middle Ages.
- Humanist weddings are ceremonies without the religious element.
- Vows help us to concentrate on what is important in a partnership.

Key Vocabulary

Commitment: A promise or firm decision to do something

Vow: To make a determined decision or promise to do

something

Inspire: To make someone feel that they want to do something and can do it.

Marriage: A legally accepted relationship between two people in which they live together or the official ceremony that results in this.

Symbols: A sign, shape or object that is used to represent something else.

Tradition: A belief, principle, or way of acting that people in a particular society or group have continued to follow for a long time.
