Jesus of Nazareth - Jewish preacher and founder of the Christian Faith in Roman Judea in the first century.

Wangari Maathai – Kenyan politician and activist.


Mother Teresa - 20th century Roman Catholic Christian, founder of the Missionaries of Charity, missionary in India and Nobel Peace Prize winner.

Mahatma Gandhi. - 20th century activist for civil rights and freedom who started the nonviolent resistance against British rule in South Africa and India. Assassinated for his actions.

Guru Nanak - founder of the Sikh religion in the Punjab in Northern India

Key Facts

Many faiths have people or behaviours which help to inspire others and we look at a few of those in this topic.
